Spring 2026

Course Description

This course provides an introduction to the principles and practices of management within modern organizations. Students will explore the core functions of management—planning, organizing, leading, and controlling—while gaining foundational knowledge of organizational behavior, decision-making, leadership, and teamwork. The course also introduces students to basic concepts in ethics, diversity, global business, human resources, communication, and organizational structure. Through readings, case studies, group discussions, and practical applications, students will begin to develop essential management skills and apply them in real-world contexts.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course, you should be able to:

1. Describe the basic functions of management (planning, organizing, leading, and controlling) and explain how managers use these functions in organizations.
2. Recognize how individual values, emotions, attitudes, and cultural backgrounds influence behavior in the workplace.
3. Identify ethical issues and the importance of diversity in organizations.
4. Explain how global and environmental factors affect businesses and demonstrate awareness of how companies respond to changes in their external environment.
5. Understand basic organizational structures and the role of human resource functions, such as hiring, training, and performance evaluation.
6. Explain key concepts of motivation, leadership, teamwork, and apply them in basic organizational or group scenarios.
7. Use self-assessment tools to identify and reflect on personal strengths, and apply these insights to create a personalized development plan to enhance management and interpersonal effectiveness.

Participation Expectations and Course Workload

In general, class meetings are divided into two parts: (A) lecture and (B) discussion (including case analyses)/activity. Class lectures are centered around key concepts and theories related to the chapter material. Class discussions and activities will be based on the main chapter content and assigned readings. Lectures will not cover all of the material presented in the textbook. Thus, you must read the assigned material prior to the class meeting to participate fully in discussions and activities.

When reviewing chapter content and assigned readings, take this time to prepare questions, comments, and/or concerns for the class discussion. Successful class discussions are characterized by a high level of dialogue between the professor and students. Lack of preparation will inhibit one's ability to synthesize difficult material and produce a one-sided conversation.

For each hour of in-person class time, you should plan to spend at least 2 to 3 hours reading, reflecting, and completing assignments.

Course Assignments - Item-by-Item Instructions

Application-based Activities (1000 points)

You are assigned 10 application-based activities via Connect. These activities are designed to ensure you can skillfully apply course concepts in more realistic settings. Each activity will typically take 10 to 15 minutes to complete.

Self-portrait video (500 points)

Self-knowledge is a critical foundation for effective career development. It enables individuals to make informed, aligned, and strategic decisions about their professional paths by understanding their strengths, values, preferences, and areas for growth. In this assignment, you will explore your personal and professional identity through a series of five self-assessments. These assessments are designed to provide insight into your personality traits, team role preferences, and key leadership competencies.

Using the insights gained from these self-assessments, you will create a 3-minute self-introduction video—an “elevator pitch” that presents you as a strong candidate to a potential employer. This video should communicate your self-awareness, personal strengths, and

professional potential, while also demonstrating your ability to connect course concepts to your own development. More detailed instructions will be available in Canvas Assignments.

Participation (1000 points)

Active and consistent participation is essential to your learning and success in this course. Your participation grade is based on both **pre-class preparation** and **in-class engagement**. The following components make up your participation score:

1. Chapter Quizzes - Complete all assigned chapter quizzes by the posted deadlines. Quizzes are designed to help you prepare for class discussions and apply key concepts. Late quizzes may receive reduced or no credit unless prior arrangements have been made.
2. Assigned videos. You are expected to watch all assigned videos, if any, before class on Tuesday each week. Completion may be verified through short written responses, online checks, or in-class discussions.
4. In-Class Activities and Assignments. Regular attendance and active participation in class activities are required. This includes group case analyses, experiential exercises, and other interactive assignments. Missing class means missing participation opportunities that cannot always be made up.
5. Quality of Participation. Participation is evaluated not only on completion but also on quality: Being prepared and contributing meaningfully to class discussions; Asking thoughtful questions; Collaborating respectfully and responsibly with peers; Staying engaged (e.g., not using devices for non-class purposes).

Overall, to earn full participation credit, you must:

- Complete all preparatory tasks on time,
- Engage actively and respectfully in class, and
- Demonstrate consistent effort in understanding and applying course concepts.

Participation is an ongoing process—your steady involvement throughout the semester is key to success.

As stated in the Undergraduate Catalog, you are responsible for attending class and completing all academic work. Make arrangements with me *in advance* if you will be missing class due to

participation in a Sanctioned University Activity, fulfillment of a religious obligation, exercise of a bereavement leave, or another university-recognized excused absence.

Peer Evaluation (200 points)

This is a large class, and much learning and interaction with the materials in class will occur in small groups. You are assigned to a small group throughout the semester. Consider your small group a small learning community and an accountability group. Encourage each other to participate, learn and grow together.

At the end of the semester, you will complete a peer evaluation to assess the contribution of each member of the group. This is to encourage you to be a team player and pull your weight! **Peer evaluations are due on the last day of class. Failure to submit this evaluation by the due date will result in a grade of 0 for your own peer evaluation score.**

Exams (1500 points)

There will be three in-person, paper-and-pencil exams, each containing 50 multiple-choice questions. The exams are closed-book and closed-note. A study guide will be provided for each exam.

Expectations of Class Members

I expect all students to show **respect and consideration** for the instructor and other students. The ability to show respect and consideration is essential to creating an effective learning environment. Furthermore, it **prepares you for appropriate behaviors in the workplace**. If you do not behave professionally in the classroom, your grade will be negatively impacted.

If you have trouble understanding the reading or completing the homework, ask questions. I expect class members to participate as equal partners in the learning experience. As a partner, I welcome your feedback and suggestions about how to improve the learning environment.
